Fourth Grade Reading Summer Activities

<u>Book</u>

This summer you should read at least two books for class.

Choose at least one of the books below: <u>Tales of a Fourth Grade Nothing</u> by Judy Blume <u>Charlotte's Webb</u> by E.B. White <u>Fourth Grade Rats</u> by Jerry Spinelli <u>Niagara Falls or Does It</u> by Henry Winkler

Feel free to get a digital copy from the library, you will not need to have this book at school. Students are encouraged to read more than one of these books, but only one will be used for their activities.

Activities

Students will use one of the novels listed above to complete a written response with a picture and a vocabulary assignment.

- All written work should be completed in the student's most legible handwriting.
- Student's name should be written at the top right of every page.
- All work will be completed by and turned in on the first day of school.

Written Summary and Illustration

Projects should be on paper approximately the size of computer paper (8.5×11) . Use two pieces if necessary. Large posters will not be accepted.

Directions:

- 1. Choose your favorite scene from the novel you read.
- 2. Write a paragraph SUMMARIZING your favorite scene.
 - Your paragraph should be at least five sentences. A sentence has at least five words.
 - Your first sentence should include the title and author of the book you read.
 - Example: I have enjoyed reading The Lemonade War by Jacqueline Davies.
 - BE DESCRIPTIVE!!! You should be able to picture what is happening from your words.
 - Do not copy sentences straight from the book. This should be in your own words.
 - Do NOT number your sentences.
- 3. Write a paragraph EXPLAINING WHY this scene is your favorite.
 - Your paragraph should be at least five sentences. A sentence has at least five words.
 - Do NOT number your sentences.
 - "It was funny." is not a fourth grade sentence. If you thought something was funny, explain WHY!
- 4. Draw an illustration of the scene you described in your summary.
 - Your drawing should be large, colorful, and show effort.
 - Brainstorm what your illustration will look like. Who is there? Where is it? What is in the background?
 - Worried that drawing isn't your thing? It certainly isn't mine. Focus on showing effort! Stick people have clothes. Try adding things to the background. Give characters speech or thought bubbles.
 - If you need to draw your picture on a second piece of paper because your writing filled a whole sheet, that is fine.
